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Year 5 and 6 Topics

The children got off to a flying start in French and their enthusiasm and energy is infectious! Children have learnt how to ask and answer basic questions about themselves, learning how to ask how they are, their names and ages. We have also covered how to describe family. They have also laid firm foundations in starting to communicate in French in the classroom, tackling classroom instructions, which they are now able to use well every lesson. We have practised all four skills through games, songs and mimes. We have also focused on the difference between how these phrases are spoken compared to how they are written and we have learnt our first three phonic rules of French; -ez (allez!), the silent "s" and the nasal sound "ans". We practised all of this by singing Frère Jacques. A fun-packed six weeks and a great start to a new subject!

Our new topic in Year 5 will cover pets, dictionary skills and learning about how Christmas is celebrated in France. In Year 6 we will be looking at Physical description and personality before celebrating Christmas in France.

I am pleased to inform you that class 5B will be taking part in a trial penpalship with a primary school near Orleans. Children will be given a child of a similar age to write to and practise their French. Revision and study skills

Although French does not make up part of home learning, looking over vocabulary covered in class will really help students start to build up their language knowledge as well as their confidence in lessons. This site uses games and challenges to allow vocabulary to be practised in a fun way.
